## WHY CZECH REPUBLIC

### Long tradition of quality education

High quality education and research, especially in Sciences, Engineering and Medicine, has a long tradition in the Czech Republic. The Charles University in Prague was founded in 1348 and is the oldest university in the Central Europe. Quality assurance of various activities of higher education institutions belongs to the main priorities of the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports.

### Diverse range of study and training programs

Czech universities offer long-standing reputations, unique conception and interesting specializations. Students can come for a short study and training visit or to complete their degree and professional qualification in a wide range of traditional as well as newly emerging disciplines.

### Offer for international students

Over 37,000 foreign students are studying and being trained in the Czech Republic and their interest is growing as the offer of study programs in foreign language (especially in English) is increasing. Czech universities and Czech training schools are more and more involved in a wide range of international cooperation activities and programs taking place in the European Union and other countries.

### Location in the heart of Europe

Studying in the Czech Republic puts you in the middle of Europe and you have a great chance to discover all European countries and places you might otherwise not have had the opportunity to visit.

### Cultural experience and fascinating history

Due to its geographic location, the Czech Republic is situated in the intersection of many cultures. The country's culture was historically formed mainly by Slavonic, German (Austrian) and Jewish influence, which resulted in a rich Central-European culture heritage and lifestyle. The Czech Republic is sure to entertain you in between your studies!

### Lower costs of living

The costs of living in Czech Republic are not as high as the cost in Western Europe and the life is thus more affordable.

## ABOUT CZECH REPUBLIC

The Czech Republic is a landlocked country in the middle of Europe. Rather than as a country in the middle of Europe, we should speak of the Czech Republic as a country in the heart of Europe ... after all, the heart is not to be found precisely in the center of the human body either:

### Area

The Czech Republic is historically divided into three regions: Bohemia, Moravia, and a part of Silesia. The total area is 78,866 square kilometers and the country's population is around 10,4 million people. The capital city is Prague, with 1,2 million inhabitants, and there are 5 other metropolitan cities with a population exceeding 100,000: Brno, Plzeň, Olomouc, Ostrava and Liberec. The Czech Republic shares borders with Germany, Poland, Austria and Slovakia. The country is surrounded by extensive mountain ranges, which form most of the border: the Krkonoše Mountains in the northeast; the Krušné Hory Mountains in the northwest; the Šumava Mountains in the west; the Hrubý Jeseník Mountains in Moravia and the Moravian-Silesian Beskydy Mountains. The highest point of elevation is the peak of Mt. Sněžka (1,602 m above sea level). Many important European rivers (the Labe, Oder, Morava, Vltava etc.) flow through the country.

### Climate

The Czech Republic as a landlocked country has moderate climate with four seasons corresponding to the temperate climate zone. The climate varies among the various regions of the Czech Republic, and throughout year. The average temperature in January, the coldest winter month is -4°C. Summer weather can be very warm with temperatures around 24°C in July. A nice time of the year to visit the Czech Republic is spring (mid-May to mid-June) and fall (September to mid-October), when the weather can be quite pleasant, although it can also be unpredictable.

### History

The first evidence of a Czech state dates back to the early Middle Ages. A kingdom was established in the Czech Lands in the 13<sup>th</sup> century and its significance peaked in the 14<sup>th</sup> century under the rule of Charles, the Czech king and Holy Roman Emperor. He established a University in Prague in 1348. After 1620, the Czech Lands became part of Austria and part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire after 1867.

Following the defeat of the Austro-Hungarian Empire in the First World War, the Czechs and Slovaks declared independence in 1918 and Czechoslovakia was established as a sovereign country. During the 1920s and 1930s, Czechoslovakia ranked among the ten most developed countries in the world. After Hitler's occupation of the country in 1938, Czechoslovakia was split into the Protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia, and the Slovak state. Czechoslovak statehood was restored after the Second World War, which ended in 1945, but with a territorial loss. The most eastern part, Transcarpathian Ukraine, was annexed by the Soviet Union. The Communist Party won the 1946 parliamentary elections in Czechoslovakia. This resulted in a change of regime and brought the country under the international communist movement, led by the Soviet Union.

November 1989 was a turning point in the history of the country. Under pressure from the citizens, the socialist regime handed over power during the so-called Velvet Revolution, initiated by students and intellectuals. Free parliamentary elections in June 1990 confirmed the course of democratic development. The unitary state became a federation and the new name of the country was the Czech and Slovak Federal Republic.

At the end of 1992 Czechoslovakia split into the Czech Republic and Slovakia. Both countries went through economic reforms and privatizations, and this process was largely successful. From 1991, the Czech Republic, originally as part of Czechoslovakia and now in its own right, has been a member of the Visegrad Group and from 1995, the OECD. The Czech Republic joined NATO in 1999 and the European Union in 2004. It held the Presidency of the European Union for the first half of 2009.

### **System of Government**

The Czech Republic is a parliamentary democracy. Every citizen over the age of 18 has the right to vote. The highest executive authority is the president, who is the formal head of state and is elected jointly by both houses of parliament for a term of five years. The supreme legislative body is the Parliament, which consists of the House of Deputies, the lower house of the legislature, and the Senate, which is the upper house. The supreme executive body is the government. The prime minister heads the government and is appointed by the president of the republic. The president also appoints other cabinet members based on the prime minister's recommendations.

### **Human Rights**

The Czech Republic respects equal rights for all its citizens. Human and civil rights including freedom of speech and the freedom of the press are guaranteed by the Constitution. Many organizations have been established to promote, protect and monitor abuse of human rights within the Czech Republic, including the Czech Helsinki Committee and the Czech Office of Amnesty International.

## Religion

The Czech Republic is a secular state and every citizen enjoys freedom of religion. The number of people practicing religion is low. More than 50% of the population describe themselves as agnostic or atheist while in northern Bohemia the proportion rises to about three quarters of the population. The main reasons for this are the suppression of the reformation movement followed by forcible mass re-catholicization (after 1627), and forty years of the official suppression of religion during the communist period (1948-1989).

## Language

The official language is Czech. Czech belongs to the Indo-European family of languages. The Slavonic languages are divided into the eastern, western and southern branches. Czech belongs to the western Slavonic family, along with Slovak, Polish and Wendish. The Czechs and Slovaks understand each other without major problems. Czech has a difficult grammatical structure but reading and pronunciation are fairly easy.

# VOCATIONAL TRAINING AND HIGHER EDUCATION PROGRAMS

## TRAINING COURSES

MDACI runs an international Educational and Vocational Training Programs to train the Youth of all level of skill and Partners' employees in MDACI's operating countries located in Africa, South America, and the Middle East. These programs constitute part of MDACI's technical and economic development support for the aforementioned developing countries. We have learnt that for a sustainable operation our investment Projects, it is necessary to implement a program of transfer of Know-How from developed Countries (Europe and America) to the Developing Countries (Africa, South America, and the Middle East). MDACI cooperates with the concerned governments and interested companies to organize the requalification of the selected groups of youth or employees for specific courses.

## Objectives

The objectives of the scheme are to enhance employability of our recent graduates and people in the labor market by adding professional social and language skills, as well as an international dimension to their CV. The opportunity of living in a foreign culture has proved invaluable in making participants more open-minded and culturally aware.

It is obvious that the type of work experience provided is mainly in the multi-professional sector and will depend upon pre-existing language skills, professional or educational background and type of career of interest.

### Admission requirements:

The MDACI training program is designed for unskillful and skillful people. However, you are requested to prove your level of Czech language and/or English or other foreign language depending on the language of instruction of your course/study program. In some cases, you are also requested to take additional qualifying courses even pass admission tests for a suitable course to your career.

For your admission application, the following documents are required:

- Curriculum Vitae;
- Filled-in application form for the selected training course. This form can be usually downloaded from MDACI website or even fill-in electronically;
- An attested copy of your higher education level;
- Medical Certificate – complete medical checkup (HIV-AIDS, others, etc.);
- Recommendation Letter;
- Police Criminal Report Sheet.

### Fees

There are three (3) Levels and each level takes 6 months of intensive training. 8 hours of training (theory at classrooms and practice at workshops) are organized per day. The courses are more focused on practical skill at workshop. The skill of the trainee shall be at the EU Standards. The three (3) levels are:

## GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE CZECH HIGHER EDUCATION COURSES

The Czech higher education system dates back to six hundred years. In 1348 Emperor Charles IV founded a university in Prague, which is the oldest academic institution in Central Europe. It is now called Charles University.

The central governing body for education is also the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports. The quality of higher education is fostered by the Accreditation Commission. Since 2001 the three cycle structure has strictly been implemented in higher education (i.e. Bachelor's, Master's and Doctoral study programs).

### Tuition language

The main tuition language is Czech, however the range of programs delivered in foreign languages (mainly in English) is expanding in particular to cater for international students.

### General Admission Requirements

The principal requirement for entering a Bachelor's degree program or a full Master's degree program is the **completion of a full secondary general education or vocational education** with a "maturitní zkouška" school-leaving examination, for fine arts degrees, applicants who have gained their "absolutorium" from a conservatoire may be admitted. Admission to a follow-up Master's degree program depends on the completion of the relevant Bachelor's degree program or its equivalent. Admission to Doctoral studies depends on the successful completion of a Master's degree program.

### Organization of Studies

The **academic year** lasts 12 months; the start is fixed by the head of the higher education institution. Courses are divided into semesters, years or blocks, which are composed of a period of teaching, an examination period and holiday. The structure of the academic year is decided by each institution. It usually begins in October and is divided into two semesters: winter and summer, with approx. a five-week examination period after each semester. A semester normally consists of 15 weeks of teaching followed by an examination period, with a week's holiday after the winter semester and a two-month holiday (July, August) after the summer semester.

### Curriculum

Deciding the content of studies and the design of study programs is one of the academic freedoms of higher education institutions in the Czech Republic. However, all study programs are subject to accreditation, which is granted by the Ministry of Education on the basis of a decision by the Accreditation Commission.

## Student Assessment

The frequency and methods of **assessing students' achievements** differ according to the field of study. In some cases, a system of partial examinations taken after each semester has been introduced; in other cases one comprehensive examination after each completed part of studies is prescribed, mostly at the end of a certain module. Study outcomes at higher education institutions are assessed mainly by a system of credits or points. The credit system (European Credit Transfer System) has been encouraged since it allows completed parts of studies to be recognized, thus contributing to transferability within the system.

## DEGREE STRUCTURE

Higher education institutions form the highest level of Czech education. They offer accredited **degree programs at three levels: Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctoral**, as well as lifelong learning courses. Higher education institutions can be either university or non-university types. Traditional university-type institutions may offer all types of degree programs while non-university institutions are characterized by providing mainly Bachelor's degree programs. The documents confirming the completion of studies and right to the appropriate academic title are a higher education diploma and a supplement to the diploma.

### Bachelor's degree programs

Bachelor's degree programs are **3 to 4 years** in duration and constitute the first level of higher education. The study program must be completed with a final state examination, which usually includes the presentation and defense of a thesis. Successful graduates may enter the labor market or continue their studies in follow-up master's programs in related fields.

### Master's degree programs

Master's degree programs may either follow on from Bachelor programs as follow-up Master's programs (**1 to 3 years**), or they may be full programs (**4 to 6 years**). Programs focus on the acquisition and application of theoretical knowledge, and on the development of creativity and talent. Graduates in Master's programs have to take a final state examination and publicly present and defend a thesis. Studies in medicine, veterinary medicine and hygiene are completed by a demanding state examination, including the presentation and defense of a rigorous thesis.

### Doctoral degree programs

Doctoral programs (which normally last **3 years**) are intended for graduates from Master's programs and focus on independent creative work in research, development or the arts. Doctoral studies are completed by way of a state doctoral examination and the public presentation and defense of a doctoral thesis (dissertation) based on original work, which must have been published or admitted for publishing.

## MBA programs

Because of growing interest, some institutions provide also study programs leading to the degree of Master of Business Administration (MBA). This study is oriented on solving real-life case studies and should enhance managerial knowledge and skills of students. See the website of the Association of the Czech MBA Schools.

## UNDERGRADUATE COURSES (first cycle)

**Undergraduate education** is an education level taken in order to gain your first tertiary degree in our universities. Hence, in many subjects and many educational systems, undergraduate education is post-secondary education up to the level of a bachelor's degree.

Many of us have considered university courses. Whether it's an undergraduate degree in a subject we're passionate about or a postgraduate qualification that we need to follow a certain career. University courses are interesting and it can be fun and life changing.

## Admission Requirement

If you have successfully completed upper secondary studies in one of the signatory countries of the Lisbon Convention, are in possession of a valid school-leaving certificate and qualify for higher education studies in your home country, you also qualify for higher education studies in the Czech Republic. However, you are requested to prove your level of Czech language and/or English or other foreign language depending on the language of instruction of your course/study program. In some cases, you are also requested to take additional qualifying courses even pass admission tests.

For your admission application, the following documents are required:

- Curriculum Vitae
- Filled-in application form for the selected study program or course. This form can be usually downloaded from MDACI website or even fill-in electronically;
- An attested copy of your upper secondary school certificate and a copy of the results from the university entrance examinations in your home country;
- Medical Certificate – complete medical checkup (HIV-AIDS, others, etc.);
- Recommendation Letter;
- Police Criminal Report Sheet.

## Goal

The goal of bachelor study is to prepare graduates for scientifically or artistically creative work. By attaining higher qualifications, including knowledge of foreign languages, Bachelor students will significantly increase their career opportunities.

## Program and Duration

Our Bachelor study program in the Czech Republic is carried out through *full-time and part-time* forms of study. Full-time study at the Czech Universities generally takes 3 years, while part-time study generally takes 5 years, with the option of interrupting the studies. Transfer between part-time study and full-time study, or vice-versa, is possible on the basis of a recommendation by the Supervisor and a written statement from the doctorand to the Dean of the appropriate faculty or the Director of the institute. The Supervisor is appointed by the Dean or the Director of the institute. Supervisors are professors, associate professors (*docents*), or distinguished scholars. It is possible, with the agreement of the Supervisor and the appropriate Branch Board, to complete the study program in a shorter time.

## Examination

Fulfillment of the coursework component of the individual plan is completed by passing the prescribed examinations and by presenting and defending a specialized study on the current state of the subject in the world. It is then possible to take the final degree examination, in which the student should demonstrate his/her specialized theoretical knowledge, methods of scientific work, and the ability to acquire new scientific knowledge and to apply it creatively. The final Bachelor examination is conducted by the *Board of Examiners for Comprehensive Bachelor Examination (Komise pro státní doktorskou zkoušku)*. Successful completion of this examination is a pre-requisite for the presentation and defense of the bachelor thesis.

This thesis is the outcome of researching a specific scientific project, and can be submitted in the form of a work that has been published (or is being prepared for publication), or as a collection of publications. The bachelor thesis must contain original new findings. The presentation and defense of the work is conducted by the *Board for the Defense of a Bachelor Thesis (Komise pro obhajobu dizertační práce)*, and is open to the public. A single re-submission is allowed in the case of an unsuccessful final examination or an unsuccessful presentation and defense of the bachelor thesis.

## Fees

The Doctorate course fee is **EUR 22,525** per year. This fee includes the followings: Visa Fee, Air tickets, Medical test recertification, Health Insurance, Accommodation and Meals (Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner), etc.

MDACI also cooperates with international organizations, government agencies and financial institutions on scholarship programs for their selected students to study in the Czech Republic and EU. A scholarship is awarded to all full-time doctoral students studying in the Czech language (both citizens of the Czech Republic and foreigners), to provide some financial support for the student while studying. This scholarship is payable for the standard length of the program (i.e., for three years). The scholarship consists of 3 parts:

- Mandatory component, the amount of which is set by the faculty, and which is paid monthly throughout the academic year;
- Mandatory component, which consists of the amount set for the accommodation, health insurance and meals (breakfast, lunch, and dinner), etc....
- Non-mandatory component, which is awarded for outstanding study results, and during involvement in research teaching activities in the school workplace

## Accommodation

Full-time doctorands studying at the Czech universities will be accommodated in a university or MDACI dormitory and are entitled to have their meals in university restaurants or at the dormitories.

## Application for enrolment

Applications for study should be submitted to MDACI on-line or by post. There are normally two rounds of applications per year. Applicants must specify, amongst other things, their intended field of study, and the intended framework of their doctoral thesis.

The application should also have attached (see Application Form):

- Application Form (to be downloaded from the our website)
- A curriculum vitae;
- Documentation of attained education and any professional experience to date;
- A summary of published works, other results of professional work, and – if applicable – an appraisal of these publications

**NOTE:** *Payment for each academic year shall be provided two (2) months before the effective date of commencement of the courses. Foreign student that will attend regularly to their classes without any acceptable justification may be deported back to their own country without reimbursement. All deportation fees shall be covered by MDACI at your own cost.*

## POSTGRADUATE COURSES (second and third cycle)

Are you considering a postgraduate course? Perhaps you've just finished your degree and are now looking for that something extra to go on your CV. Or maybe you're thinking about taking a postgraduate course because you've got a personal interest in the subject and want to learn about it in more depth.

In the EU and the Czech Republic, the hierarchy of post-graduate degrees is as follows:

- **Master's degree** – is an academic degree granted to individuals who have undergone study demonstrating a mastery or high-order overview of a specific field of study or area of professional practice. Within the area studied, graduates are posited to possess advanced knowledge of a specialized body of theoretical and applied topics; high order skills in analysis, critical evaluation or professional application; and the ability to solve complex problems and think rigorously and independently. They are awarded after graduation from university. These are sometimes placed in a further hierarchy, starting with degrees such as: a) Master of Arts, b) Master of Science, c) Master of Philosophy, d) Master of Letters. These degrees may be taught or by research, which last 1-2 years. Professional degrees such as the MArch (Master of Architecture) can last to three and a half years to satisfy professional requirement to be an architect.
- **Doctoral Degree Programs** – are often further divided into academic and professional doctorate. An academic doctorate can be awarded as a PhD (*Doctor of Philosophy*), or as a DSc (*Doctor of Science*). The *Doctor of Science* degree can also be awarded in specific fields, such as a Dr.sc.math (Doctor of Mathematics), Dr.sc.agr. (Doctor of Agricultural science), DBA (Doctorate in Business Administration), etc. In some parts of Europe, doctorate is divided into the PhD or 'junior doctorate', and the 'higher doctorate' such as the DSc, which is generally awarded to highly distinguished professors. A doctorate is the terminal degree in most fields. In the EU countries, including the Czech Republic, there is little distinction between a PhD and DSc. In the UK, PhD degrees are often equivalent to 540 CATS credits (credits Accumulation and Transfer Scheme) or 270 ECTS European credits (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation Scheme), but this is not always the case as the credit structure of doctoral degrees is not officially defined.

### Essential Information about our Doctoral Degree Program

Doctoral studies in the Czech Republic are in accordance with the *Rules of Doctoral Study, Study and Examination Code for Students of the Czech Universities*, and the guidelines of individual faculties and institutes.

### Admission

To be eligible for admission to doctoral study, applicants must hold a master's degree (not a bachelor degree) in the same discipline or a related field. Admission to the program is at the discretion of the Dean of the respective faculty, or the Director of the institute, on the basis of the results of the selection procedure. Experience in the chosen field is not a condition of admission, and there are no age restrictions. Students in their final year of studies may also apply; admission is conditional on graduation. Applicants who are admitted to doctoral study become *doctorands* of the Czech Universities.

For your admission application, the following documents are required:

- Filled-in application form for the selected study program or course. This form can be usually downloaded from MDACI website or even fill-in electronically;
- **For Master's Degree Program:** an attested copy of your Bachelor's degree certificate;
- **For Doctoral Degree program:** an attested copy of your Master's program certificate
- Medical Certificate – complete medical checkup (HIV-AIDS, others, etc..);
- Recommendation Letter;
- Police Criminal Report Sheet.

## Goal

The goal of Doctorate study is to prepare graduates for scientifically or artistically creative work. By attaining higher qualifications, including knowledge of foreign languages, Doctorands will significantly increase their career opportunities.

## Program and Duration

Our Doctorate study program in the Czech Republic is carried out through *full-time and part-time* forms of study. Full-time study at the Czech Universities generally takes 3 years, while part-time study generally takes 5 years, with the option of interrupting the studies. Transfer between part-time study and full-time study, or vice-versa, is possible on the basis of a recommendation by the Supervisor and a written statement from the doctorand to the Dean of the appropriate faculty or the Director of the institute. The Supervisor is appointed by the Dean or the Director of the institute. Supervisors are professors, associate professors (*docents*), or distinguished scholars. It is possible, with the agreement of the Supervisor and the appropriate Branch Board, to complete the study program in a shorter time. Doctorands studying are, for the duration of their studies, classified as regular tertiary students, with all associated rights and responsibilities. In part-time or full-time study, doctorands must submit their doctoral thesis within 7 years maximum from the commencement of their studies.

The studies take place according to an individual study plan, which designates the time allocated to study, specialized and scientific activities with plans for the development of the doctoral thesis, study at other workplaces (which may be outside the Czech Republic), designated minimum teaching duties, dates of examinations for courses taken, and other responsibilities. The individual study plan is specified by the Supervisor, after the doctorand has expressed his/her agreement with it.

## Examination

Fulfillment of the coursework component of the individual plan is completed by passing the prescribed examinations and by presenting and defending a specialized study on the current state of the subject in the world. It is then possible to take the final degree examination, in which the student should demonstrate his/her specialized theoretical knowledge, methods of scientific work, and the ability to acquire new scientific knowledge and to apply it creatively. The final doctoral examination is conducted by the *Board of Examiners for Comprehensive Doctoral Examination (Komise pro státní doktorskou zkoušku)*. Successful completion of this examination is a pre-requisite for the presentation and defense of the doctoral thesis.

This thesis is the outcome of researching a specific scientific project, and can be submitted in the form of a work that has been published (or is being prepared for publication), or as a collection of publications. The doctoral thesis must contain original new findings. The presentation and defense of the work is conducted by the *Board for the Defense of a Doctoral Thesis (Komise pro obhajobu dizertační práce)*, and is open to the public. A single re-submission is allowed in the case of an unsuccessful final examination or an unsuccessful presentation and defense of the doctoral thesis.

Doctoral studies can be prematurely ended by the student, on the basis of a written application. In the case of long-term neglect of responsibilities, the studies can be ended by a decision of the Dean or the Director of the institute.

## Fee

The Doctorate course fee is **EUR 23,525** per year. This fee includes the followings: Visa Fee, Air tickets, Medical test recertification, Health Insurance, Accommodation, MEALS (Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner).

## Accommodation

Full-time doctorands studying at the Czech universities will be accommodated in a university or MDACI dormitory and are entitled to have their meals in university restaurants or at the dormitories.

## Application for enrolment

Applications for study should be submitted to the on-line or by post. There are normally two rounds of applications per year. Applicants must specify, amongst other things, their intended field of study, and the intended framework of their doctoral thesis.

The application should also have attached (see Application Form):

- Application Form (to be downloaded from the our website)
- A curriculum vitae;
- Documentation of attained education and any professional experience to date;
- A summary of published works, other results of professional work, and – if applicable – an appraisal of these publications
